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Since the inception of the JPII magazine in 2014, it has been retitled twice. The inaugural launch title, Knight Times, was replaced with Beyond Ourselves in 2015. Over the school's short 18-year history, the JPII shield has become known throughout the local community, representing our school on and off the athletic fields and extending its representation to all members of our school community, including our beloved alumni.

The Bible references armor of a spiritual type in Ephesians 6:11, "Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil." Saint John XXIII, who was beatified on the same day as Saint Pope John Paul II, encouraged everyone to put on the body armour of Christ in one's quest to stay faithful: "Hail, Christ the King! I put on your uniform, I fasten your sword; I am proud to call myself a knight of Christ. Give me a soldier's heart, a knight's valor, O Jesus, and I will always be by your side."

As we launch the sixth year of the JPII alumni magazine, we launch a new title as well ~ The Shield. As in medieval times, the JPII shield is a coat of arms. The four quadrants each represent one of the school's four pillars: faith life, academics, fine arts, and athletics. I hope you enjoy reading our annual magazine, which we have renamed *The Shield*. A shield is important in any family's legacy. It represents our name, our brand, and our mark. It demonstrates our pride in our past and our pledge robust endowment is a key to to go forward and face any challenge boldly. We can tell a tale of pioneers who started a school from scratch with a vision to do something amazing. They faced obstacles and even a flood, but the City on the Hill stands taller than ever. Campus Ministry revamped our programs and has added class service retreats, which are doing some amazing work with our community in Sumner County and Nashville. No matter where you look on campus, JPII is making great strides, and we are not yet finished making advances to serve our students.

Why are we doing so well? We have amazing people at this school. They are centered on our mission to serve God by developing the talents of our students to make this world a better place. We have creative and hardworking leaders, caring and talented teachers, and smart, energetic staff. Every day they show up ready to work and committed to our students. We are different by choice. We seek excellence in all. JPII is built on the strength of alumni, parents, and benefactors who wholeheartedly love this school.

With shields up, we go into the future, ready to face the dragons and capture the castle. Our biggest goals are to build an endowment to secure the financial future of the school, and to create a new master site plan that will Letter from the Headmaster

make JPII one of the leading Catholic schools in the nation in the decades to come. A making our school strong, and without building it, we limit our potential. With nearly 30 percent of our students on financial aid and a desire to keep tuition as low as possible, we need annual dividends from an



endowment to help make Catholic education possible for our future families. Our strategy to build this fund is through major gifts and planned giving. Two of our well-known founders, Karen Phillips and Betty Mayberry, have teamed up to lead our planned giving campaign. They are meeting with members of the community and starting a program to get everyone to consider JPII when planning their estates or considering a legacy gift. We cannot think of two better shield bearers to lead this charge. Our new master site plan is in process, and we who originally designed our beautiful campus. They are looking at redesigning classrooms, adding labs, and giving our academic programs state of the art space. An indoor athletic center, an expanded dining hall, and an improved student commons area are just a few of the developing plans to improve and enhance the student experience. experiences of students can be just as important as the academic experience. Therefore, we see the importance of making space for positive and healthy interactions for the students. Finally, we are considering possible locations for an athletic center, which will serve all of our sports teams year round. The center will include an indoor field and track and give us space to offer more to our growing women's programs. We have acquired land which provides us with room to grow, and we have created a blueprint that would allow the school's future leaders to add things that we cannot even yet imagine.

I hope you sense the excitement we are feeling. We want our families and alumni to be proud of what they have done to build this school. We promise to honor you by making this school better and better each year. We ask for your continued prayers, support, donations, and encouragement. Shields Up, Knights!

n St. Patrick's Day last year, the JPII choir lined up in the freezing New York wind at the performers' entrance of Carnegie Hall. As they eventually filed through the door, removed their winter coats, and made their way backstage, they marveled at this once in a lifetime moment. The months of rehearsals at school and the days of rehearsals in a hot hotel ballroom led up to this performance on the world-famous Carnegie Hall stage. Soon, the JPII choir took their place among a group of musicians from around the world. The house lights dimmed, the conductor's arms raised, the instruments played, and the choir began the first movement of Magnificat.

Under the direction of Mr. Mike O'Neill, the JPII Chamber and Concert Choirs were selected by the DCINY organization to perform at Carnegie Hall, one of the most prestigious stages in the world, with choirs from around the world and from as far as Australia. "It was kind of surreal because you always hear about Carnegie Hall but never imagine actually performing there. It's just a different experience to be on stage looking out at the chairs, which go farther back than you can even see. It was the biggest concert hall I've ever performed in. The entire experience was just really awesome," reflected senior Chris Muller.



Mr. O'Neill agreed: "It was magical. It is *the* world-famous concert hall. We got to share

the stage with singers from all over the world with a full professional orchestra and professional director. JPII sang with a combined choir of over 200 singers



According to senior Ava Tomkins, rehearsals "lasted for five hours. The most memorable parts of the five-hour rehearsals were the choir director's jokes and mannerisms. It was a very different experience compared to Mr. O'Neill's directions. I think it was interesting to see different styles of directors for such a complicated piece."

with several movements and pauses,
mirroring the *Magnificat* in the Bible."

Before their performance in Carnegie Hall, the choir was invited to sing for

Mass at the Church of St. Ignatius Loyola on the Upper East Side of Manhattan. According to senior Ava Tomkins, "Singing there was amazing. The acoustics sounded angelic, and our voices reverberated off of the walls, which was really cool to hear. We had many people come up to us after

and tell us how beautiful it was. It was a really cool experience overall, and it marked one of my favorite moments of the whole trip."

Senior Chris Muller elaborated on the St. Ignatius experience: "We got to sing music we had prepared for the Mid-State Festival in Tennessee at St. Ignatius in New York. We were up in the choir loft next to a magnificent organ, and to hear our music in that setting was amazing."

This trip meant a lot for the reputation of JPII's choir, as, according to Ava, "Participating in this event steps up our recognition and the overall awareness of

our choir. Our school name was mentioned all around Carnegie Hall, and all of the singers from around the world were so curious about us kids from the only high school that was selected to perform." Mr. O'Neill received compliments about how professional the JPII choir students were as they joined the adult groups for the long rehearsals.

Another highlight of the trip was seeing *Phantom of the Opera* on Broadway. Many of the students and chaperones had never been to a Broadway show and enjoyed the experience of seeing a live musical production, complete with an orchestra. The show had many of the choir members singing along

with the soundtrack for the rest of the trip. Mr. O'Neill said that seeing the production was important because he wanted his students to have the experience of watching professional musicians in a Broadway theatre. The dinner at the Stardust Diner before the show included many Broadway

hopefuls performing while also serving their tables, which gave students a realistic view of the dedication and struggle it takes to become a Broadway star. The talent at the diner and at the theatre was inspiring to all of the travelers.

The performances were not the only thing that students enjoyed on the trip though, as the choir and their chaperones toured New York City's iconic sights, such as the 9/11 memorial, Rockefeller Center, Central Park, and Times Square. Some of the choir spent their final evening in the city at the top of the Empire State Building, including junior Alex Browning, a member of the Chamber Choir, who thought that "it was a lot of fun seeing the lights of New York City from the top of the Empire State Building with my friends. It was an amazing experience seeing New York at night, despite how cold it was."

The JPII Choirs continue a long tradition of sharing their talent with the world. JPII had performed once before at Carnegie Hall under the previous choir director Jj Ebelhar in 2006. They have also performed in Cincinnati, Italy, and most recently, in the Disney Candlelight Ceremony. Mr. O'Neill explained that he definitely plans to continue the tradition of performing on the road: "The hope is that Voices uKnighted will participate in a national convention in 2021 in Orlando, and about 6-8 months later, I am working toward traveling to Orlando for the Disney Candlelight Ceremony with all the choirs."

# Donation Sparks Investment planning in JPII's Innov8 Program

Part of the JPII Innov8 program, Mr. Bob Page's Investment and Entrepreneurial classes, which give students tools and financial support to make investments in the stock market or to create a business, received an anonymous gift of \$290,000. The donor is interested in how the course allows students to explore topics like finance and business ownership.

Page's course fits perfectly into the Innov8 project-based learning model. Known as a creative and forward-thinking program that makes a college preparatory education transformative and practical, JPII's Innov8 program, led by Director of Innovation Jennifer Dye, includes a combination of project-based courses, internships, and independent study. Through involvement in Innov8, students are challenged to be bold, encounter failure, and learn to see those failures as opportunities to grow and learn. Instead of textbooks and tests, the Innov8 program allows the students to become the innovators of the future—leaders in all fields of industry, government, and the arts who will create their own jobs, rather than simply finding them. The Innov8 program shifts the traditional classroom model by empowering teachers who have unique interests and real-world experiences to become mentors to students who develop solutions that solve realworld problems. Innov8 has allowed JPII students the opportunity to discover their unique potential to affect change in their community and the world.

Mr. Page's strength as one of the Innov8 teachers is indeed his wealth of experience in the world of finance. Originally from New York where he worked on Wall Street, Mr. Page eventually moved to Nashville, where he worked in banking and started a family. After a successful career in the hard knocks field of finance, he left to pursue his passion of working with kids as a teacher and lacrosse coach. As a very successful college lacrosse player at the University of Virginia, where he is in the school's athletic hall of fame, Mr. Page returned to the sport he loved by introducing it to kids who were typically more familiar with football than lacrosse. Mr. Page started the JPII lacrosse program and quickly built a following among kids who loved the sport just like he did. Mr. Page also helped JPII to build a robust AP program by sharing his understanding of finance in the AP Economics courses. When Innov8 started at JPII, he was one of the first to get on board, as he was drawn to classes centered on students' passions and interests. His investment and entrepreneurial classes quickly became two of the most popular courses in the program.

Page explained the way in which the recent donation will not only enrich the investment program but also benefit Innov8 service projects: "Over the next few months, students will create an Investment Plan to support the creation of an *endowment-like* fund while managing a virtual individual investment portfolio. Together, these activities along with lessons on the keys to investing

lessons on the keys to investing (diversification, compounding, and risk analysis, etc.) will establish the students' investing confidence. Central to the Investment Plan will be how to invest the funds and distribute the funds to deserving JPII projects. It is anticipated that the winning proposal will invest a portion of the recent gift and make a cash grant to a JPII service project. These transactions will undoubtedly add to the project's authenticity and excitement." We appreciate that one of the caveats of the donation is that it will be used to support servicerelated projects, which fits perfectly into our mission as a Catholic school: helping students use their talents to transform our world.

The first group of students to be awarded funds from the donation were in Mr. Page's fall Innov8 course. Seniors Cade Davis, Ethan Adcox, Aaron Kernell, and Vicente Cadena advanced their understanding of investing as they developed the most comprehensive investment plan for their portfolio with the most effective presentation (pictured above). They were awarded funds to enhance an existing JPII bus dedicated to community service projects.





In Omaha on a calm, late June evening, the sun began setting behind a baseball stadium as the sold-out crowd roared. Tensions were high. In this final game of a tied College World Series, Michigan was trying to recover after a game two loss to Vanderbilt. As the Commodores' starting pitcher took the mound, his focus revealed that he was not about to let that happen.

All year, Vanderbilt's Coach Tim Corbin had given the ball to Mason Hickman in clutch games, and his decision to start Mason and leave him in through the first five innings set the tone for the rest of the game. The Vanderbilt Commodores went on to win by a final score of 8-2. The JPII community watched on televisions all over the country as their own Mason Hickman

celebrated his team's College
World Series win. Even though the
national championship was on the
line, Mason's performance that
evening seemed to be unfazed by
the pressure, which might be why he
claims that his most valuable skill
as a player just may be his "ability to
remain calm" in a deafening crowd
of fans.

However, Mason's second-best skill must be, of course, pitching. Mason



has worked hard to gain the Sundaystarting position as a sophomore on the nation's best college team since he began his pitching career at nine years old playing travel baseball. Throughout middle school, he developed by playing baseball yearround while trying to deal with the awkward reality of growing "about a foot per year." Along the way, his coaches and parents recognized something special in him as they supported his "playing up" in age, which Mason also credits as helping him develop as a player.

Mason explained that after he got through his growth spurts and arrived at JPII, things began to come into focus for him: "Starting junior year, I got more serious about baseball." In the summer before junior year, Mason received attention from some local D1 schools, which made him realize that continuing baseball after high school might be in his future. After playing his freshman and sophomore years, he gave up varsity basketball to train year-round for baseball. He used his time in Coach Justin Geisinger's strength-training program at JPII to get stronger and prepare for his final two high school seasons.

JPII's Head Baseball Coach Chris Parker described Mason as a "quiet competitor," someone who gets the job done and always competes to win. When asked about Mason's best baseball skills, Coach Parker emphatically said with a smile, "He throws strikes."

Along with Coach Parker, Coach John Dempsey, the current JPII Athletic Director and one of Mason's former coaches, raved about Mason's control saying, "He puts it where he wants it." Also, he revealed that Mason was one of two guys he let call his own game, which reflects a great deal of trust from coach to player. Coach Dempsey also recalled that "Mason's work ethic and focus stood out to me along with his ability to never waste any time."

As an AP Scholar at JPII, Mason revealed that he concentrated on preparing himself not only for success on the field but also in the classroom as a high school student. Playing for a national championship baseball program is demanding, but so is keeping up with coursework as a junior at Vanderbilt University. Mason explained, "I'm able to do both because JPII taught me how to manage my time. JPII and Vanderbilt both require extreme balance between athletics and academics, but both programs offer students the opportunity to get help when they need it. They are both supportive of students in that way." Mason credited the academic program at

JPII for preparing him for the rigor of Vanderbilt as he pursues a degree in Human and Organizational Development with a minor in Business.

Two distinct memories came to Mason's mind when he reflected on his time at JPII. His favorite memories involved the time he spent with his teammates, as Mason recalled, "The road trips with the team along with dog-piling after big wins." As Mason thought about the JPII community, he remembered how caring the culture was in the school. After coming back to JPII this year for a football game, Mason realized

how close-knit the JPII community truly is. He said, "That event brought everyone together, reconnecting administration to alumni; the experience made me realize how much JPII cares for their alumni." He described the JPII community as a "family" as he remembered the way his "teachers were always so caring, enthusiastic about what they taught, and focused on [his] success."

At JPII, we often say, "Once a Knight, always a Knight." When his teachers watch him pitch for Vanderbilt as a Commodore, they still claim Mason as that JPII Knight who walked the halls, sat in their classrooms, and wore the JPII uniform. As the crowd roars and Mason takes the mound for any team, he should know that his teachers and coaches will always be enthusiastic about his success as they, too, are in the crowd cheering for him.



#### Why did you become a teacher?

I teach because I love my students. I realize that sounds cliché, but that is the reason. I have always wanted to become a teacher; when I was little, I had a white board and markers in my basement. I loved babysitting, nannying, and working at summer camps. This was always what I wanted to be. I was really lucky that the path that led me to teaching was working for Americorps after college in Washington, D.C. at an inner-city, public school. I was teaching first graders. It was the hardest, most exhausting year of my life, and it was one of the best years of my life. I absolutely fell in love with teaching, with all of the ups and downs, all of the sad times and the hard times - because those are always offset by the joyful times. You have all of those frustrating times when students ask you the same questions you just answered, but then you have those moments when a student gets it - those moments make me love teaching. After my experience in Washington, I thought I would be an elementary teacher. I moved to Louisville, taught 4th grade, and got my Master of Arts in Teaching at Bellarmine University.

#### How did you end up teaching at JPII?

I got a call from Dr. Peper asking me if I would ever consider teaching theology; he knew I had a B.A. in Religious Studies from Centre College. I thought about how JPII was so instrumental in developing who I am as a person. I feel like so much of who I am today is because of the four years I spent at JPII as a student. So, getting to go full circle and teach at a place where I feel like I learned from so many great teachers, like Dr. Peper and Mrs. Smith, is probably the coolest and most fulfilling experience I could experience as a professional. I think JPII is the best high school in America; I know I'm biased.

### How do you help students see the connections between what you teach and their lives?


Connecting theology to what goes on outside the classroom in some ways is easy because most of my

students come from a faith background, whether they are Catholic or another denomination, so talking about how we celebrate and understand our faith often has real-life applications for them. The beautiful thing about teaching theology at JPII is that we have a real mixture of kids with different backgrounds. Students come from Catholic backgrounds, many different Christian denominations, and other religions, so having those conversations in class about how they encounter their faith in different ways is really fascinating. For my freshmen especially, I hope that they see that it's normal and good to discuss their faith. Some of them don't know that it's okay to ask questions about God. For high schoolers, students at an age of 14 -18, this is a really pivotal time in their lives when they are asking those big questions, like "what does faith mean to me" and "who is God." Those topics apply to theology but also go beyond the classroom.

I also try to stay involved with the Diocese of Nashville, with the retreats and events they host, because that's another connection I can give to the kids, especially if they don't have another faith community. I can invite them to events that give them a faith community to which they can belong.

### What is your goal for the Campus Ministry program at JPII?

My goals for Campus Ministry include a comprehensive, leveled retreat program that builds on itself every year and extends beyond just a one day event. I also look forward to developing more student involvement in ministry, whether through music, liturgy, or leadership on retreats. I hope to make Campus Ministry more accessible to our students through a variety of opportunities for engagement with the Mass, prayer services, and retreat experiences. We have added class service retreat days, as well.

he auditorium was filled with whispers and silent prayers as **L** the JPII student body prepared for another weekly Mass. For many, although Mass was an important part of their week, everything seemed the same. However, one person standing at the back of the auditorium might have disagreed. Father David Dodd, a Franciscan friar and an alumnus of the IPII class of 2008, was the guest celebrant that day. Because this was his first time back on campus since he graduated, his only hope was that everything would go smoothly as he celebrated his first Mass as a priest at his alma mater. In that very moment, a shrill sound permeated throughout the hallways. They had been waiting in the doorway a moment too long, and the incense had triggered the fire alarm. The Mass was temporarily postponed as everyone rushed

outside to the parking lot.

One year later, when Father Dodd returned for another Mass, he began his homily in the best way he could.

He calmly started with a simple, "No, I'm not going to set off the fire alarm this time. Don't worry." In one simple moment, his whole crazy journey towards the priesthood was complete, best of all, with a joke that fit him well.

The biggest mistake one can make when first meeting Father Dodd is to assume that he is just a normal priest, going through all the same training and practice as the celebrant at your church. However, this class of 2008 alumnus offers a more

fascinating story of faith and growth. His full title is Father Dodd, TOR, which stands for the Third Order Regular of St. Francis of Penance. Father Dodd explained, "My primary vocation is not of the priesthood, but to live the whole of my life the three vows of poverty, chastity and obedience." His role in a religious community has led him all the way from Nashville to Herndon, Virginia, where he serves as an associate pastor at St. Joseph's Church. Best of all, such a long title matches his long, wondrous journey through JPII and beyond, a journey that almost didn't happen in the first place.

As Father Dodd, then known to his friends as Will, finished up his 8th grade year, JPII was the last school on his mind. Almost all of his friends were going to Father Ryan for their freshman year, and naturally Father

mother, Mrs. Kay Dodd, explained that they chose JPII because, although they were well-connected and felt comfortable choosing any school within the Catholic community, Pope was the one school that allowed students to grow into their own identities by offering so many various, accessible programs. With children who all have unique goals and personalities, Mrs. Dodd appreciated the variety of opportunities, including sports, challenging academics, and an active Campus Ministry program

that allowed her four diverse children to explore each of their interests and talents.

Father Dodd's own experience attests to this fact. Even though he felt very much like an outsider at first, he quickly gained a group of friends to call his own. By the time he had reached his junior and senior years, Father Dodd

had finally grown into himself. Mrs. Dodd spoke about one of the greatest aspects of JPII has always been its openness to allowing all students participate in athletics. One of Father Dodd's greatest goals during high school was to be part of the football team, but he acknowledged that he wasn't as great of an athlete as he needed to be during his junior year when he first attempted to join. He ended up working with Jason Everhardt, who is still the athletic trainer at IPII. Dodd became both a student athletic trainer, as well as a waterboy for the team. Around the same time, he took his first AP classes, discovering "intellectual gifts [he] never knew he had," and began to feel more ready than ever for college. Most importantly, among all things he discovered about himself during his final years of high school, what seemed like a simple faith retreat became what Father Dodd now calls an "awakening."

One of the most talked-about and anticipated events of any Knight's last two years of high school is SEARCH. Designed to help one grow closer to their faith, the SEARCH retreat attracts multitudes of high school students throughout the diocese. Thus, when the time came for Father Dodd, he attended

SEARCH 256; although he had already been raised as Catholic, he still desired an opportunity to learn. Fortunately, what he learned was beyond what he ever imagined. Father Dodd explained, "I realized that in order to be great, I need great people around me," which was the impetus to begin his path toward discovering his vocation. Granted, the path toward choosing religious life remained a long one; Father Dodd found himself initially blocked by peer pressure and the standards of society, which tends to emphasize career and family. While he recognized none of this as being "bad," he realized, "I still had the desire to do more." His experiences at JPII aided in that journey, revealing to him that there was more to faith than he had ever thought about before. But this was just the beginning of his long journey.

Unlike the standard four to five years that priests must go through in seminary, religious formation for Father Dodd and other Franciscan Friars was seven years. Such a process offers the religious order opportunities to participate in the group more in depth and to grow closer in love and faith over an extended amount of time. For Father

Dodd, "the biggest lesson ... is [that] life is 'undulating,' meaning it has its ups and downs, peaks and valleys, good times and bad times, but God is constant." By the time the seven years had passed, he felt even closer to God than ever before, and yet, he believes he still has plenty to learn and discover.

Now, only a half of a year after Father Dodd was ordained, the entire Dodd family, not just Father, remains loyal to the school that guided their son to his vocation. In addition to Father Dodd, Mr. and Mrs. Dodd have also sent three other children through JPII. Mrs. Dodd laughed, "Having our kids at JPII is so important to us that we are willing to commute all the way from Bellevue every day!" Mrs. Dodd added that all of her children have found ways to explore their interests, whether in sports, through the Innov8 program, or by having access to inclusion opportunities in the Hand in Hand Options Program.

Rachel Dodd-Ritter is the second oldest and an alumnus of the class of 2011. Both Father and Rachel finished college with honors, and according to Mrs. Dodd, "they told me after their college graduations that JPII was harder and the academic program helped them prepare for college." Rachel, inspired by her experiences as a Peer Buddy in JPII's Hand in Hand Options Program, decided to pursue a career as a special education teacher. Rachel was also a member of the basketball and volleyball teams during her time at JPII.

Currently, the two youngest Dodd children are on campus. Hannah Dodd is a freshman, and Zach Dodd will graduate this year. Zach is on the track team and an active member of Model UN, and he thoroughly enjoys classes like European History and AP Latin, which have led to his future goal to eventually teach.

Most importantly, Zach's enjoyment of having his sister Hannah on campus with him this year seems very apparent. When I asked him what his favorite memory was of JPII, he quickly cited the first day of school this year: "Seeing Hannah smiling from ear to ear on her first day of school, already excited by the time she was on the bus."

Hannah is a part of the evergrowing Hand in Hand Options Program, which allows students with intellectual and developmental disabilities to be fully included in the JPII community. Hannah adores all of her classes, fueled by her love of her friends and classmates. Although she currently is not part of a sport,

As the oldest in the family, Father Dodd began the connection to JPII that his family continues today. Both of his visits these past two years were surprising ones, but he was truly happy to return to the campus that helped shape him forever. Father Dodd simply explained it all in a phrase: "[It] felt like a true homecoming and was very humbling." Father hopes to return to campus whenever he can as he continues religious life in Virginia. JPII led him to his vocation, so he will more than happily give that guidance back whenever, and wherever, he can.

# SCHOLARS

rom its inception, JPII has developed relationships with international scholars through multiple exchange programs. Many will remember the Laughlin Exchange Program in which students from JPII and England enjoyed visiting each other's families and schools for a total of four weeks each year. Soon after, the German exchange program through CYE, brought many students who spent their senior year at JPII. Over the years, JPII has also welcomed several students from South Korea who quickly became part of the JPII family during their multiple years at

our school.

Most recently, the JPII international program has included a growing group of international scholars from China, thanks to a partnership with the Cambridge Institute of International Education, which has a network of students from throughout Asia who want to study in high schools and colleges within the United States. These students come to JPII for most of their high school years and live with host families connected to the JPII community.

JPII's international scholars program has evolved over the past few years to include an extensive support system for these students as they adjust to a new culture and academic



work in their second, third, or even fourth language. They not only quickly become part of the family with whom they live and experience life in America, but they also receive academic support through a course led by Mrs. Diandian Liu, Cambridge's Student Development Manager (SDM). Mrs. Liu offers invaluable support as one of the few SDMs who also serves as an on-site teacher. She speaks both languages and has close family connections through the Knox family to JPII, which makes her instrumental to her students' and the program's success. (Mrs. Liu is married to



Taylor Holmes '10 and is the daughter-in-law of Marcie and Fred Knox).

Mrs. Liu clarified, "My role of academic support is to help international students succeed both academically and culturally." Mrs. Liu is an excellent resource for international students because she understands and knows both Chinese and American cultures and

languages. Mrs. Liu explained, "They are in a completely new learning environment. Their knowledge needs to be activated in the new context. I'm here to help them make that process easier by strengthening their language skills and providing scaffolds." "Mrs. Diandian," as the students affectionately call her, understands the struggle international students are going through and wants to help them grow and learn in the process. Working closely with JPII's Dean of Studies Andrew Griffith, she is seen as a great support as she assists international students with anything they need.

Having this new generation of international scholars from China has been mutually beneficial for students and for the JPII community. Our Chinese students have become involved in many programs at JPII as they adapt to our culture, and they also enrich our campus as they share their cultural traditions with JPII students and host families. For

example, Chinese students invited the community to celebrate their traditional Mid-Autumn Festival, complete with moon cakes enjoyed and Chinese greetings exchanged. Mrs. Lui's hope is that her students can enrich and educate the American students as they learn about each other's cultures and traditions.



Going through the Cambridge Institute of International Education program, international students are exposed to a world of opportunities, new studies, and a wide variety of people. Host families are also enriched through the experience of inviting an international scholar into their home, and many families have chosen to host multiple international students over the years.

Three of the JPII International Scholars shared their thoughts about their experiences in the program:

**Darren Liu**, a junior, traveled straight to the United States from China to study at Pope John Paul II High School. Not knowing much about Tennessee, Darren found it complicated getting on the plane to travel to America; therefore, for Darren, this felt like a new life with a very different environment as he left his family and friends as well as his native language. Before Darren got off the plane, he prayed for a positive experience with his host family and studies, and in the end, he received that. Darren said, "When I saw people laughing and smiling at me, it made me feel warm, and then I realized I would enjoy my time here." When Darren first joined the Hayes Family, Jennifer Hayes stated,

"Initially being with Darren, our day would consist of getting up and going around Nashville, showing him different areas, cool places to eat, and other fun things to do. Now having Darren stay here for 2 ½ years, we can say that he is genuinely a part of our family." The Hayes family even traveled to China to meet Darren's family this past summer. The Hayes family would not change this opportunity for anything else, and they would love to continue



having different international students even after Darren graduates because they love hosting and helping students find their way through JPII. Darren has become a valuable member of JPII's Voices uKnighted, has traveled to New York City and performed at Carnegie Hall with the choir, and was recently chosen for Mid-State Choir.

Yolanda Huang, a current sophomore at JPII, was in a different state before arriving in Tennessee. She began her experience in Missouri living with around 20 other Chinese students as the program looked for new host families for the students. She found comfort from first being around other students who were all experiencing the new surroundings in America together, and they quickly formed friendships during the experience. Yolanda explained a few different characteristics between China and America: "One thing I love about America is how the teachers allow you to accomplish work on your own. I have time for extracurricular activities, to hang out with my friends, and to relax at home." Although she misses her

friends and family, she loves the culture and studies of America and wouldn't change this opportunity for anything else. She loves the excellent curriculum at JPII, and she believes that she has more opportunities to grow in her faith. Yolanda feels comfortable going to tutorials and asking for help even after school hours. She enjoys the specific help from Mrs. Liu, too. Yolanda loves her photography class and uses her photographs in her design projects on the Knights Media and Marketing staff.



Oscar Xiong, a junior, lived in New Jersey for two years with two different host families each academic year. This is Oscar's first year at JPII with his third host family in America. He says all of his experiences have been positive, whether connecting at the dinner table or going on various trips with his host families. He really enjoys his less stressful schedule at JPII. At home, Oscar attended school for almost 12 hours a day, so the transition to America was drastic for him. He found comfort at JPII with Mrs. Liu because he says she helps the international students with anything they needed. Overall, from Oscar's perspective, he traveled to America to explore a different area of the world, new studies, and experience different people. He feels as if he has more independence to explore different interests. Oscar is a member of the JPII Knights Media program as has developed several short-film projects and has contributed to the broadcast show during his first semester at JPII.


### KNUPTUALS Alumknights who Tied the Knot

Morgan Roth Smith '11 married Nathan Smith on April 22, 2017. The couple resides in Hendersonville.


